1. Read *Interpreter of Maladies* by Jhumpa Lahiri
2. Sign up for the DP Lang & Lit Summer Class on Google Classroom using the following code:

3. Click on the only assignment in the stream called *Summer Reading Assignment*
4. Attached to the assignment are the instructions. Based off of the "Levels of Questions" Guide, create one contextual question and one conceptual question focused on *Interpreter of Maladies*. With each question, give your own response (200-300 words per response). Your response should be typed and MLA formatted (including citations!).
5. Submit your assignment to Google Classroom by the start of the year AND bring a hard copy of your questions and responses to class.

On the first day of class, bring your book and paper to class. We will have further assignments at the beginning of the school year.

Levels of Questioning

Factual Questions

- Are verifiable—answers found on the page.
- Responds to questions: who, what, when, where, how?
- Takes the reader into the text.

Contextual Questions

- Are verifiable—answers found in the text, based on details and examples.
- Responds to questions: why, how, and so what?
- Takes readers through the text, allowing them to evaluate and interpret evidence from the visual, spoken, or written text.

Conceptual Questions

- Connects the text to other texts, ideas, or situations through analysis.
- Responds to questions: How are these similar, different, related ?
- Takes readers beyond the text, allowing them to analyze the relationship between this text and other texts, ideas, events, or situations.
